THE COACHES

MIKE TOMLIN was named the 16th head coach in Pittsburgh Steelers history on Jan. 22, 2007. Hired at the age of 34, Tomlin became only the third head coach hired by the Steelers since 1969.

Tomlin became the youngest head coach in NFL history to both coach in and win a Super Bowl when he led the Steelers to a 27-23 victory over the Arizona Cardinals in Super Bowl XLIII. By winning the Super Bowl in only his second season as a head coach, he also became the fastest to win Super Bowl title in Steelers history.

Tomlin is one of only seven coaches in league history to win a Super Bowl within his first two seasons as an NFL head coach.

Tomlin finished his second season with a 12-4 regular-season record and his second consecutive AFC North Division title, becoming the only Steelers head coach to win division crowns in each of his first two seasons. He also set a record with 22 regular-season wins in his first two years at the helm and is the only Steelers head coach to win at least 10 games in each of his first two seasons. Tomlin's .688 winning percentage (22-10) after two years is the best in Steelers history.

The Steelers' defense was dominant under Tomlin's guidance in 2008, leading the NFL in total defense (237.2), pass defense (156.9), points per game (13.9), total yards per play (3.9), rushing yards per attempt (3.3), passing yards per attempt (4.7) and third down efficiency (31.4), and finished second in league rushing defense (80.3).

Tomlin led the Steelers to a 10-6 record in 2007, and became just the second coach in team history to post a winning record, win a division title and earn a playoff berth in his inaugural season.

Tomlin guided the Steelers to the NFL's top-ranked defense in 2007, yielding only 266.4 yards per game. The Steelers' defense ranked third in the NFL against both the run (89.9 avg.) and pass (176.5 avg.), and also finished third in the league in total yards allowed per play (4.6). Pittsburgh's defense led the NFL in passing yards per play (5.7) and first downs allowed per game (15.6), and finished second in the league in points allowed per game (16.8).

Tomlin was the NFL's second-youngest head coach in 2007, and he became only the second Steelers coach in team history to win at least 10 games during his first year at the helm. The Steelers posted a 7-1 record at home in 2007 and were 5-1 in the AFC North (3-0 at home).

Tomlin became only the second Steelers head coach to win his first three games. During 2007, the Steelers became just the fifth team in NFL history to win their first four home games by at least 20 points.

Tomlin was a three-year starter at wide receiver at William and Mary (1990-94) and finished his career with 101 receptions for 2,046 yards and a school-record 20 TD catches. A first-team All-Yankee Conference selection in 1994, he established a school record with a 20.2 yards-per-catch average.

JOHN FOX is in his eighth season as head coach of the Carolina Panthers.

In compiling a 63-49 regular season record and 5-3 postseason mark, Fox has demonstrated a remarkable consistency while guiding his team through the peaks and valleys that accompany an NFL season.

- In Fox's first season as head coach in 2002, the Panthers were coming off a one-win season that included 15 consecutive losses and responded with a six-game improvement to go 7-9.

- A year later, Carolina struggled through a three-game losing streak after jumping off to an 8-2 start, but Fox steadied the ship and the Panthers advanced to Super Bowl XXXVIII after winning the NFC South title.

Pittsburgh Team Notes:

- Pittsburgh improved to 6-2 all-time in the preseason against the Bills.
- The Steelers are now 109-96-1 all-time in the preseason.
- The last time the Steelers posted a shutout in the preseason was a 20-0 victory over the Buffalo Bills in 2001.
- After a scoreless first quarter, the Steelers used a 13-play drive that culminated with a 34-yard field goal by **K Piotr Czech** to take a 3-0 lead.
- On the Bills' first play from scrimmage following the field goal, **LB James Farrior** picked off a Trent Edwards pass and returned it 22 yards for a touchdown to make it 10-0 with 12:21 left in the first half.
- With 31 seconds left in the half, **RB Rashard Mendenhall** scored from four yards out to make it 17-0 at the half.
- Both teams were scoreless in the second half.
- Pittsburgh had 20 first downs and limited the Bills to just eight first downs, including just three in the first half when the first teams were playing.
- The Steelers outgained the Bills 359-135 in the game, including 278-86 in passing yards.
- Pittsburgh did not allow Buffalo to convert a third down (0-for-8). The Steelers converted 10-of-17 (59%) third-down attempts.
- Pittsburgh held the ball for 41:15 to the Bills' 18:45.
- The Steelers were flagged six times for 40 yards and Buffalo was penalized five times for 33 yards.
- Pittsburgh finished with two sacks for 10 yards while Buffalo posted one sack for four yards.
- **QB Dennis Dixon**, **DE Nick Eason**, **WR Santonio Holmes**, **TE Sean McHugh**, **DT Steve McLendon**, **RB Willie Parker**, **OG Darnell Stapleton** and **RB Frank Summers** did not dress.

Pittsburgh is 6-4 all-time in the preseason versus the Carolina Panthers, including a 3-2 record in Carolina...the Steelers have won two straight preseason games against the Panthers, and three of the last four...Pittsburgh defeated the Panthers, 19-16, on Aug. 28, 2008 at Heinz Field on a 43-yard field goal by **K Jeff Reed** as time expired...the Steelers trounced the Panthers, 19-3, behind four Reed field goals in their last preseason matchup at Carolina on Aug. 30, 2007...Pittsburgh has won two straight preseason games in Carolina...the Steelers have won three straight regular-season matchups versus the Panthers after dropping the first-ever meeting between the two teams, 18-14, in the season-finale of the 1996 season...Pittsburgh defeated the Panthers, 37-3, at Bank of America Stadium on Dec. 17, 2006 behind 132 rushing yards and one touchdown from **RB Willie Parker**.

2009 PRESEASON NOTES

Pittsburgh posted its first shutout in the preseason since 2001 with its 17-0 victory over the Buffalo Bills last week in Week 3...it marked the first shutout since it blanked the Bills 20-0 in the 2001 preseason...rookie first-round draft pick **DE Ziggy Hood** has been on a tear thus far, posting a team-best three sacks...the team has eight sacks in the preseason while allowing just three...the Steelers have five interceptions on defense, including one each by **CB Joe Burnett**, **LB Tom Korte**, **LB James Farrior** (returned for a TD), **CB Keiwan Ratliff** and **LB Bruce Davis**...the Steelers are averaging 36.0 yards per kickoff return in the preseason, led by **RB Stefan Logan** (39.3 avg.)...Logan has been the primary punt return man for the Steelers in the preseason as well, averaging 13.9 yards per punt return...free agent **WR Shaun McDonald** leads the team with 11 catches for 100 yards (9.1 avg.) in the preseason while **RB Rashard Mendenhall** leads all rushers with 98 yards on 30 carries (3.3 avg.) with one touchdown...Pittsburgh is averaging 292.3 yards of total offense (90.0 - rushing; 202.3 - passing)...the Steelers have given up just six points in the first half of their preseason games, primarily when the first-team defensive unit has been on the field.

TEAM NOTES

Steelers in the Preseason: Pittsburgh owns a 109-96-1 all-time record in the preseason.

This marks the 11th time the Steelers and Panthers will be meeting in the preseason with Pittsburgh leading the series 6-4. Pittsburgh won last year's preseason matchup, 19-16, at Heinz Field in the preseason finale. The teams are playing in the final preseason game for each squad for the ninth time since 1997.

Camping Out: Pittsburgh concluded its 43rd consecutive year of preseason training camp in Latrobe, Pa. The Steelers' 43-year tenure at Saint Vincent College ranks second (tied with Minnesota) in the NFL for training camp longevity, trailing only the Green Bay Packers, who have held their preseason camp at St. Norbert College in DePere, Wisc., for 51 years.

Super Bowl XLIII Champions: With their 27-23 victory over the Arizona Cardinals in Super Bowl XLIII, the Steelers became the first team in NFL history to win six Super Bowls. The Steelers' six wins in the Super Bowl broke a tie for the most with Dallas and San Francisco.

Pittsburgh has appeared in seven Super Bowls, including two in the past four years. The seven trips to the Super Bowl are the second most in NFL history, trailing only the Dallas Cowboys (8).

Fresh Faces: The Steelers currently have 24 new faces on their 2009 training camp roster. The new faces include nine draft picks, nine rookie free agents, four veteran free agents and two first-year players.

The four veteran free agents include **WR Shaun McDonald**, **C Alex Stepanovich**, **CB Keiwan Ratliff** and **WR Brandon Williams**.

The Steelers' nine 2009 draft picks include **DE Ziggy Hood (1st)**, **OG Kraig Urbik (3a)**, **WR Mike Wallace (3b)**, **CB Keenan Lewis (3c)**, **CB Joe Burnett (5a)**, **RB Frank Summers (5b)**, **DE Sonny Harris (6th)**, **C A.Q. Shipley (7a)** and **TE David Johnson (7b)**.

Steelers-Panthers Connections: Several Steelers have ties to the Panthers and the Charlotte area.

K Jeff Reed (Charlotte), **RB Willie Parker** (Clinton) and **LS Greg Warren** (Goldsboro) all played at North Carolina and also hail from the Tar Heel state.

Panthers with connections to the Steelers and Pittsburgh include Head Coach **John Fox**, who coached with the Steelers from 1989-91 and the University of Pittsburgh from 1986-88. Special teams coach **Danny Crossman** played defensive back at University of Pittsburgh from 1987-89. **OG C.J. Davis** and **OT Jeff Otah** played for Pitt while **LB Dan Conner** and **OT Gerald Cadogan** played at Penn State. **OG Keydrick Vincent** was signed by the Steelers as an undrafted rookie free agent in 2001 and played in Pittsburgh from 2001-04. **LB Mortty Ivy** played at West Virginia.

Sack Attack: In the 2008 postseason, the Steelers posted nine sacks, including a 2008 Steelers' postseason-high four in the AFC Divisional Playoff win over the San Diego Chargers.

LB LaMarr Woodley had six sacks in those three games, including two in Super Bowl XLIII, to lead the team, while **DE Brett Keisel**, **LB James Harrison** and **DE Aaron Smith** each tallied one.

In four postseason games during the **Mike Tomlin** era, Pittsburgh has posted 13 total sacks.

AFC North Division Champions: Pittsburgh captured its second straight AFC North Division championship in 2008 after its 13-9 victory over the Baltimore Ravens in Week 15.

Head Coach **Mike Tomlin** became the first coach in team history to win the division in each of his first two seasons as head coach.

The Steelers clinched a first-round bye in the postseason and the No. 2 seed.

Pittsburgh has won an AFC-best 19 division titles since the NFL merger in 1970.

Divisional Dominance: Pittsburgh finished the 2008 season undefeated against AFC North Division foes. It marked the first time since 2002 the Steelers had an unblemished record in divisional play (6-0).

Pittsburgh finished the 2007 season 5-1 against AFC North foes. The Steelers' lone loss within the division last year was in the regular-season finale at Baltimore when Pittsburgh rested a number of starters after already clinching the AFC North crown.

The Steelers have won 13 of their last 15 games against divisional opponents.

Conference Control: The Steelers finished last season with a 12-4 mark, including an impressive 10-2 record against AFC opponents.

Pittsburgh's 10-2 record within the conference tied for the best mark in the NFL with Indianapolis. The last time Pittsburgh finished with a better record against AFC opponents was in 2004 when it finished 11-1.

Shutting Down The Scoreboard: Pittsburgh finished the 2008 season by allowing an NFL-low 223 points, an average of 13.9 points per game. The 223 points are the fewest against the Steelers since they allowed only 212 points during the 2001 season, an average of 13.3.

Dominating Defense: Pittsburgh came up just short of finishing the season the league leader in all four major defensive categories (rushing defense, passing defense, total defense, scoring defense).

The Steelers led the NFL in total defense (237.2 avg.), pass defense (156.9 avg.) and scoring defense (13.9 avg.), and finished second in rushing defense (80.3 avg.) to Minnesota. Pittsburgh nearly became the first team since the 1991 Philadelphia Eagles to lead the league in rush defense, pass defense and total defense.

Pittsburgh could also have become the first team to lead the league in all four categories since the NFL merger in 1970. The last team to lead the league in all four categories was the 1969 Kansas City Chiefs, who led the AFL that season.

Additionally, the 80.3 rushing yards per game the Steelers allowed are the least for Pittsburgh since 2001 (74.7 avg.) and the second-least by the Steelers since the NFL merger in 1970.

The Steelers' 2,511 passing yards allowed were the fewest since they allowed 2,500 in 1990. It also marks the team's third-lowest total during the 16-game schedule era (began in 1978).

Sustaining Success: Pittsburgh has made the playoffs five times and won the AFC North four times since the divisional realignment in 2002. The Steelers won the AFC North Division for the second consecutive year in 2008.

The Steelers have won 19 division titles since the NFL merger in 1970, the most in the AFC during that time. The 2008 season also marks the fourth time they captured the AFC North Crown since 2002.

Clamping Down: The Steelers tied an NFL record by keeping their first 14 opponents of the 2008 season under 300 yards of total offense.

The Steelers held every opponent to less than 300 yards of total offense until they yielded 323 to Tennessee in Week 16. The 14 straight games tied the 1973 Los Angeles Rams for the longest streak to start a season in the NFL since the merger in 1970.

If You Build It, They Will Come: The Steelers averaged 62,890 fans in 2008, the third-highest attendance average in team history.

The Steelers broke the single-game attendance record at Heinz Field in the 2008 AFC Championship Game when 65,350 fans watched them defeat the Baltimore Ravens en route to Super Bowl XLIII.

The Steelers set a club regular-season attendance record in Week 8 when 64,991 fans watched them play the New York Giants. It was also the third-largest attendance figure in Heinz Field history.

Pittsburgh set the team home attendance record in 2005 by averaging 63,429 (507,434 total).

Pittsburgh has sold out 281 straight games at home, dating back to Nov. 5, 1972 versus Cincinnati.

Pittsburgh's largest average attendance at Three Rivers Stadium was 58,077 in 1998. Following is a look at the team's average attendance in its seven years at Heinz Field:

Defense! Defense! Defense! The Steelers defense once again gave opponents fits in 2008 as it ranked in the top three in the NFL in several categories.

The Steelers ranked first in the NFL in total defense, allowing just 237.2 yards per game. Pittsburgh had 20 interceptions in 2008 and posted an AFC-best 51 sacks. The Steelers allowed a league-low 3.9 yards per play, the lowest of any defense in the NFL since 1978.

Pittsburgh ranked in the top three in the NFL in several other defensive categories, including passing net yards/game (156.9, 1st), passing net yards/play (4.7, 1st), first-down yards plays/opponent (3.93, 1st), red-zone efficiency (33.3, 1st), third-down efficiency (31.4, 1st), points/game (13.9, 1st), rushing yards/attempt (3.3, 1st), rushing yards/game (80.3, 2nd) and first downs/game (15.0, 2nd).

In the 2008 regular-season finale against the Cleveland Browns, Pittsburgh limited the Browns to just 20 yards passing.

In Week 13 at New England, Pittsburgh held QB Matt Cassel to just 169 yards passing while picking him off twice and sacking him five times in the game after he had posted consecutive 400-yard passing games.

LOOKING AHEAD...

The Steelers open their 2009 regular-season schedule on Thursday, Sept. 10 against the Tennessee Titans. Kickoff at Heinz Field is set for 8:30 p.m. and will be nationally televised on NBC (locally WPXI-TV, channel 11). The game kicks off the 2009 NFL season slate.

In Week 8, the Steelers limited the New York Giants' league-leading rushing attack to just 83 yards on 35 attempts (2.4 avg.). The Giants entered the game averaging 169.7 yards per game on the ground.

Picking Your Poison: The Steelers had 20 interceptions in 2008, which ranked third (tied) in the AFC and sixth (tied) in the NFL. Pittsburgh posted at least one interception in six of the final seven games of the regular season.

For the year, Polamalu had a team-best seven interceptions, which was a career high. Carter was second with three interceptions in 2008.

Turning Up the Heat: Pittsburgh finished first in the AFC and second in the NFL with 51 sacks in 2008. The 51 sacks were the most since the Steelers had a team-record-tying 55 sacks in 2001.

The Steelers recorded a season-high seven sacks (twice) in the Week 7 victory at the Cincinnati Bengals and the Week 9 victory at the Washington Redskins.

Since 1994, the Steelers have led the AFC in sacks four times and the entire NFL twice.

Sacks became an official NFL statistic in 1982, however, a record of "passers tackled" was kept prior to that time. Following are the Steelers' single-season sack totals dating back to 1970:

Pick Six: The Steelers returned two interceptions for touchdowns in 2008 in the regular season and one by **S Troy Polamalu** in the AFC Championship game that sealed the Steelers' victory.

S Tyrone Carter, who started in place of the injured **S Ryan Clark**, picked off a pass in the regular-season finale against the Cleveland Browns and returned it 32 yards for a touchdown. Carter finished with two interceptions against the Browns.

CB Deshaea Townsend intercepted a Tony Romo pass with less than two minutes remaining and returned it 25 yards for a touchdown in the Week 14 victory versus the Dallas Cowboys.

Townsend's game-winning interception marked the first time in the Super Bowl era (since 1966) that the Steelers winning score came on an interception return for a touchdown in the last two minutes of the fourth quarter or overtime.

Townsend has three career interception returns for a touchdown, but this was his first since Oct. 31, 2004 when he returned one 39 yards for a score against New England at Heinz Field.

Covering The Field: Pittsburgh ranked first in the NFL in kickoff coverage in 2008, allowing 19.1 yards per return. In 2007, the Steelers ranked eighth in the AFC and 16th in the NFL by allowing 22.6 yards per return.

Additionally the Steelers led the AFC and ranked fourth in the NFL allowing just 6.2 yards per punt return this season.

Third-Quarter Supremacy: Pittsburgh allowed just 29 points in the third quarter all season, which was the fewest in the NFL in any quarter.

The Steelers outscored their opponents 87-29 in the third quarter this year. They allowed Cleveland (Week 2), Cincinnati (Week 7), Indianapolis (Week 10) and Baltimore (Week 15) to each collect field goals in their respective games, while the Dallas Cowboys had 10 points in Week 14 at Heinz Field and Tennessee notched a touchdown in Week 16.

Turnover Advantage: The Steelers had 29 takeaways (20 interceptions, nine fumble recoveries) for a plus-four (+4) turnover advantage in 2008.

Since 2001, the Steelers have, at minimum, reached the AFC Championship Game when finishing a regular-season with a plus-seven (+7) or better turnover margin.

The following is a look at how the three most recent Steelers' teams finished when having a +7 or better turnover margin since 2001:

Continued Success: Since the 1970 merger of the National and American Football Leagues, the Pittsburgh Steelers own the second-best record in the NFL.

Holding Their Ground: Over the past eight years, Pittsburgh's defense has been among the best at holding its opponents to the fewest rushing yards in the league. The Steelers allowed just 80.3 rushing yards per game in 2008, including a season-low 38 against the Jacksonville Jaguars in Week 5.

Pittsburgh ranked first in the AFC and second in the NFL in rushing defense and the 80.3 rushing yards per game are the second-least the Steelers have allowed since the NFL merger in 1970 (74.4 in 2001). The Steelers ranked second in the AFC and third in the NFL by allowing 89.9 rushing yards per game in 2007.

In the past six seasons, Pittsburgh has allowed an NFL-low eight 100-yard rushers. Baltimore is second with 12.

Additionally, since 1994 the Steelers have led the AFC in rushing defense eight times and the entire NFL three times.

Run Stuffers: The Steelers did not allow a 100-yard rusher in 2008 and have allowed only three 100-yard rushers in the past 82 games (postseason included). The Steelers previously had a streak of 34 straight games in which it did not allow a 100-yard rusher.

200 Plateau: Since the NFL merger in 1970, Pittsburgh is 95-6 (.941) in the regular season when it rushes for more than 200 yards in a game. The Steelers have won 24 straight games in which they have eclipsed that mark for rushing yards.

Pittsburgh is 7-0 all-time in the postseason when rushing for more than 200 yards.

Controlling The NFC: The Steelers have won 16 of their past 20 games (including a Super Bowl XL victory over Seattle and a Super Bowl XLIII victory over Arizona) versus teams in the NFC, dating back to 2003.

The Steelers are 90-54-1 (.624) all-time against teams from the NFC, including a 51-19-1 record at home and a 34-35 mark on the road. Pittsburgh had won eight straight games versus NFC teams at home prior to its 2008 Week 8 loss to the New York Giants.

COACHING NOTES

Another First: Head Coach Mike Tomlin won his first playoff game in just his second season, which is the fastest for any coach in Steelers' history.

Bill Cowher won his first playoff game in his third season and Chuck Noll won his first postseason game in his fourth season.

Tomlin is also the youngest coach in NFL history to both coach in and win Super Bowl.

Few And Far Between: Head Coach **Mike Tomlin** became the first coach in Steelers history to win division titles in each of his first two seasons. In 2007, the Steelers captured the AFC North in his first season.

Tomlin became just the second head coach in team history to post a winning record in his first season with a 10-6 record in 2007.

No Sophomore Jinx: Head Coach **Mike Tomlin** broke the team's all-time record for winning percentage for a coach in his first two seasons.

Tomlin owns a 22-10 (.688) record in his two seasons as head coach of the Steelers. Former coach Bill Cowher previously had the best start in two seasons at the helm of the Steelers, posting a 20-12 (.625) mark in 1992-93.

Tomlin secured the record with a win over the Baltimore Ravens (Week 15).

Double-Digit Duty: Head Coach **Mike Tomlin** led the Steelers to a 12-4 record in 2008. He became the first coach in team history to win at least 10 games in each of his first two seasons after finishing his rookie season with a 10-6 record.

LeBeau's Magic: Defensive coordinator **Dick LeBeau**, a current finalist for induction into the Pro Football Hall of Fame, is in his 51st NFL season as either a player or coach. He is considered the creator of the "fire-zone" or "zone blitz" defensive scheme that is used in multiple varieties by many NFL and college teams.

LeBeau returned to the Steelers for a second stint as the team's defensive leader prior to the 2004 season. Since his return, the Steelers defense has ranked at or near the top of most major statistical defensive categories.

INDIVIDUAL OFFENSIVE NOTES

Title Man: QB Ben Roethlisberger led the Steelers to the AFC Championship Game three times in his first five seasons.

Roethlisberger joined Roger Staubach, Bernie Kosar, Tom Brady and Donovan McNabb as the only quarterbacks to lead their teams to the conference title game at least three times in their first five seasons as the starting quarterback.

The following are a few notes for Roethlisberger in the postseason:

- Owns an 8-2 all-time record in the postseason as the starting quarterback.
- His eight wins are the second-most playoff wins by a quarterback in the first five seasons of their career, trailing only Tom Brady (9).
- Became the youngest quarterback in league history to win a Super Bowl (Super Bowl XL) at 23 years old.
- Is the second-youngest starting quarterback to win his second Super Bowl (26 years, 336 days old on Feb. 1, 2009; Tom Brady - 26 years, 182 days on Feb. 1, 2004).
- Engineered a game-winning, 78-yard drive that culminated with a six-yard touchdown pass to WR Santonio Holmes for the go-ahead score with 35 seconds left in Super Bowl XLIII.
- Became just the 10th quarterback in NFL history to win more than one Super Bowl (Terry Bradshaw, Joe Montana - 4; Troy Aikman, Tom Brady - 3; Ben Roethlisberger, John Elway, Bob Griese, Jim Plunkett, Bart Starr, Roger Staubach - 2).
- Led the Steelers to three AFC Championship Games in his first five seasons as the starting quarterback.
- In three postseason games in 2008, was 54-of-89 for 692 yards passing with three touchdowns and one interception (91.6 passer rating).
- In 10 career postseason games, has a 61.9 completion percentage (172 of 278) for 2,239 yards. His 172 completions

and 2,239 passing yards are the second-most in team postseason history.

- Has 15 touchdowns and 12 interceptions and an 87.2 passer rating in 10 postseason games.

Controlling The North: QB Ben Roethlisberger owns a 23-4 (.852) record as a starter, including the postseason, against AFC North opponents during his career with the Steelers.

Roethlisberger has won 12 straight games against divisional foes as the starter, which is the longest current streak in the NFL and the longest since Peyton Manning won 12 straight from 2004-06.

In his 27 career games versus division opponents, Roethlisberger posted a perfect passer rating once (11/5/07 vs. Baltimore) and has recorded a passer rating of over 100.0 a total of 12 times.

Elite Company: QB Ben Roethlisberger surpassed several elite quarterbacks for most wins by a starting quarterback in his first five seasons with his 49th victory in Week 14 versus the Dallas Cowboys. He is the only NFL quarterback to win at least 50 games in his first five seasons in the league.

Comeback Kid: QB Ben Roethlisberger had five fourth-quarter come-from-behind victories in the 2008 regular season, including the 17th of his career in Week 15 at Baltimore.

Roethlisberger engineered a 12-play, 92-yard drive in the final three minutes of the game that ended with WR Santonio Holmes catching his four-yard touchdown pass, which clinched the AFC

North Division title for the Steelers. On the drive, Roethlisberger was 7-for-11 for 89 yards.

A complete listing of all of Roethlisberger's fourth quarter and overtime comebacks entering this season are available on page 239 of the Steelers media guide.

Passing Perfection: QB Ben Roethlisberger, who earned his first trip to the Pro Bowl in 2007, has achieved a number of outstanding single-season accomplishments in his five-year career, including achieving a feat three times that is rarely done in the NFL.

Roethlisberger, who set the team's single-season mark for passer rating (104.1) in 2007, has had a perfect passer rating (158.3) three times in his career, tying him with QB Peyton Manning for the most in NFL history (minimum 10 attempts).

Roethlisberger's 29 career 100-plus passer rating games rank second in team history behind Terry Bradshaw, who had 31 such games since the passer rating rule was implemented in 1973.

Passing Fancy: QB Ben Roethlisberger threw for 3,301 yards in 2008 and is the first quarterback in team history to pass for over 3,000 yards in three consecutive seasons.

Roethlisberger eclipsed the 3,000-yard passing mark for the second straight season in 2007, tying the team record for consecutive 3,000-yard passing seasons, set by Terry Bradshaw in 1979-80.

Roethlisberger finished with 3,154 passing yards in 2007. He finished with 3,513 passing yards in 2006, which is the second-highest single-season total in team history.

Roethlisberger averaged 234.2 passing yards per game in 2006 and finished 211 yards shy of the team's single-season yardage record set by Terry Bradshaw in 1979.

Roethlisberger became just the fifth different quarterback in Steelers' history to pass for over 3,000 yards in a single season. He joins Terry Bradshaw (twice), Kordell Stewart (twice), Tommy Maddox (once) and Neil O'Donnell (once) as quarterbacks in team history to achieve the feat.

Super Bowl MVPs: The Steelers are the first team in NFL history to have two Super Bowl MVP wide receivers on the same team at the same time.

WR Hines Ward won Super Bowl XL MVP honors after finishing with five receptions for 123 yards with one touchdown in the 21-10 victory over the Seattle Seahawks.

WR Antonio Holmes won Super Bowl XLIII MVP honors after catching the game-winning touchdown pass with 35 seconds remaining in the fourth quarter to seal the 27-23 victory over the Arizona Cardinals. Holmes finished with nine catches for 131 yards and one touchdown.

Chart Topper: WR Hines Ward owns many of the top receiving records in Pittsburgh history and became the first Steeler with 9,000 receiving yards last year.

Ward is the team's all-time leader in receiving yards (9,780), receptions (800) and receiving touchdowns (72).

In 2007, Ward became the team's all-time leader in receiving yards. He surpassed Hall of Famer John Stallworth, who finished his career with 8,723 receiving yards.

Additionally, Ward has 20 career 100-yard receiving games, which is second on the team's all-time list behind only Hall of Famer John Stallworth (25).

Top Dawg: WR Hines Ward is the only wide receiver in Steelers history to be voted to four Pro Bowls. Ward's 1,043 receiving yards in 2008 made him the first Steelers receiver to reach 1,000 yards five times during his career with the team. No other Steeler has more than three.

In 2002, Ward became the first receiver in Steelers history to catch 100 passes (112) in a season. He also became the first Steelers receiver with three consecutive games with at least 100 yards receiving. His 12 touchdown receptions in 2002 tied him with Louis Lipps (1985) and Buddy Dial (1961) for the highest single-season total in team history.

Ward was selected to the 2002-05 AFC Pro Bowl squads. The following is where Ward ranks in Steelers history in several key receiving categories:

Ward On The Run: WR Hines Ward's versatility makes him a threat to run the football as well as catch a pass.

Ward has 430 career rushing yards to mark the most by a Steelers wide receiver in team history.

Ward scored his first career rushing touchdown in 2004 against Philadelphia.

Gimme The Rock: RB Willie Parker finished 2008 with 791 yards on 210 attempts (3.8 avg.) and rushed for over 100 yards four times.

In the regular-season finale against the Cleveland Browns, Parker had 116 yards rushing on 23 attempts (5.0 avg.) and scored his fifth rushing touchdown of the season. His 34-yard touchdown run was the longest run from scrimmage by the Steelers in 2008.

Parker Proving His Worth: RB Willie Parker led the Steelers in rushing for the fourth consecutive season in 2008, finishing with 791 yards. He joined Jerome Bettis, Franco Harris, John Henry Johnson and Fran Rogel as the only backs in team history to lead the team in rushing in four straight seasons.

Parker rushed for over 1,000 yards for the third consecutive season as he finished the 2007 season with 1,316 yards. He became just the third running back in team history to accomplish the feat (Jerome Bettis, Franco Harris).

In 2007, Parker had a league-leading eight 100-yard rushing games, which is fourth in team history.

Parker has 25 career 100-yard rushing games and the Steelers are 22-3 in those contests.

Parker finished the 2007 season just 179 yards shy of his career-high 1,494 yards before suffering a season-ending injury in Week 16. He finished the year ranked third in the AFC and sixth in the NFL.

Parker surpassed his previous best from the 2005 season (1,202) after rushing for over 100 yards in seven games in 2006. His 1,494 rushing yards in 2006 are the third-highest single-season total in team history, finishing just shy of reaching 1,500 for the year.

Moore Making His Case: RB Mewelde Moore did an excellent job of filling in when RB Willie Parker was injured in 2008 and often split time in the backfield when Parker played.

On the year, Moore was second on the team with 588 yards rushing on 140 carries (4.2 avg.) with five touchdowns and caught 40 passes for 320 yards (8.0 avg.) with one touchdown.

In four games replacing Parker as the starter in the backfield, Moore had 360 yards rushing on 80 carries (4.5 avg.) with five touchdowns and 16 catches for 89 yards (5.6 avg.) with one touchdown.

Moore became the first Steelers running back other than Parker or Jerome Bettis to have over 100 yards rushing and two rushing touchdowns in a regular-season game since 1995. Bam Morris finished with 101 yards rushing and three touchdowns on Nov. 19, 1995 in a win at Cincinnati.

Holmes Heating Up: WR Santonio Holmes finished the 2008 regular season with a career-high 55 catches for 821 yards (14.9 avg.) with five touchdowns. He was also named MVP of Super Bowl XLIII after finishing with nine catches for 131 yards with one touchdown, the game-winner with 35 seconds left in the fourth quarter.

Holmes caught the game-winning, four-yard touchdown pass in the Week 15 victory over the Baltimore Ravens with less than a minute remaining that clinched the AFC North Division title for the Steelers. He finished that game with three catches for 21 yards against the Ravens.

Holmes led the Steelers with 942 yards (18.1 avg.) and eight touchdown receptions in 2007 despite missing three games.

Holmes' 942 yards receiving in 2007 were a new career high, surpassing his 2006 total of 824 yards. He had a career-high 133 yards receiving on four catches (33.3 avg.) in the Week 16 win over St. Louis, marking his third 100-yard receiving game of the season and fourth of his career. His performance was highlighted by a career-long 83-yard catch.

Miller Time: TE Heath Miller has developed into one of the Steelers' most potent offensive weapons. He had a career-best 48 catches for 514 yards (10.7 avg.) with three touchdowns in 2008 despite missing two games with an ankle injury.

Miller had a career-high eight catches for 69 yards (8.6 avg.) in Week 16 at Tennessee.

Miller has 21 career touchdowns, which is third on the team's all-time list for touchdowns by a tight end. Pittsburgh is 14-5 when Miller finds the end zone.

Miller's blocking ability separates him from many "receiving" tight ends.

INDIVIDUAL DEFENSIVE NOTES

Harrison In Charge: LB James Harrison finished second in the AFC and fourth in the NFL with a career-high and team-record 16 sacks in 2008. His outstanding play in 2008 had him voted NFL Defensive Player of the Year, got him his second straight start in the Pro Bowl this season as well as his second consecutive team MVP award.

Harrison had 100 tackles on the year, which ranked third on the team and was a career high, and posted a team-best 34 pressures. He has 28.5 sacks in his career and the Steelers are 14-7 when he posts a sack. For the year, Harrison forced seven fumbles, which led the NFL.

Sack Attack: LB James Harrison had a career-high 16 sacks in 2008, breaking the team record for sacks in a season. Mike Merriweather previously held the record since 1984.

Harrison broke the Steelers' single-season sack record with his one sack against the Tennessee Titans in Week 16.

Double Trouble: The Steelers have a tradition of fielding some of the best pass-rushing linebackers in the NFL.

In 2008, **LB James Harrison** and **LB LaMarr Woodley** broke the team's top sack duo record (since 1982) by combining for 27.5 sacks. The 27.5 sacks by Harrison (16) and Woodley (11.5) broke the record previously held by Jason Gildon (13.5) and Joey Porter (10.5) in 2000 and Kevin Greene (14) and Greg Lloyd (10) in 1994.

Harrison was fourth in the NFL in sacks while Woodley ranked ninth (tied). In 2007, Harrison finished with a team-high 8.5 sacks while earning his first trip to the Pro Bowl (starter). Woodley posted four sacks in a limited role in 2007 as a rookie.

Bringing The Wood: LB LaMarr Woodley had a career-high 11.5 sacks and 78 tackles (53 solo) in 2008, his first season as a starter. Woodley tallied at least one sack in eight of the 15 games he started and the Steelers were 7-1 when he posted a sack.

Woodley ranked ninth (tied) in the NFL in sacks with 11.5. He ranked first (tied) in the NFL with four fumble recoveries for a defensive player.

Woodley twice earned GMC Defensive Player of the Week honors for his efforts in 2008 (Weeks 1 and 7). Woodley owns an NFL record by posting two sacks in each of his four postseason games.

Fantastic Farior: LB James Farior, who earned his second trip to the Pro Bowl in 2008, signed a new five-year deal prior to the 2008 season. He responded by leading the team in tackles with 146 in 2008, the third-highest total in his career, and also had 3.5 sacks.

For his career, Farior has 10 interceptions, including seven with Pittsburgh and three while playing for the Jets.

Timmons Time: LB Lawrence Timmons, the Steelers' No. 1 pick in the 2007 NFL Draft, enters the 2009 season as a starter for the first time in his career. However, Timmons made a number of big plays for the Steelers defense in 2008.

Timmons was a major factor in the Steelers' Week 15 victory over the Baltimore Ravens in 2008. He finished with six tackles against the Ravens, including a 14-yard sack in the fourth quarter that knocked Baltimore out of field goal range.

In the regular-season finale against the Cleveland Browns, Timmons had a career-high 12 tackles (seven solo) after making his second career start in place of the injured LB James Harrison.

Timmons posted his first career interception in Week 13 versus the Patriots and returned it 89 yards to the one-yard line. The 89-yard interception return was the third-longest in team history and the longest since Jack Hinkle returned one 91 yards versus the New York Giants on Oct. 9, 1943. Timmons finished with five tackles against New England.

Timmons, who saw action in base defensive packages and the nickel package, had 71 tackles on the year to go with his five sacks. He had a career-best two sacks in the Steelers' Week 7 victory at Cincinnati.

Man Of Troy: SS Troy Polamalu had one of the finest seasons of his career in 2008, posting a career-high seven interceptions among a number of big plays. He had an interception in a career-high four straight games (Weeks 12-15).

Polamalu's seven interceptions, which finished second (tied) in the NFL, were the most for the Steelers since Willie Williams had seven picks in 1995. He now has 17 career interceptions. The Steelers are 13-3 when Polamalu has an interception.

Polamalu was looking to become the first Steeler to lead the league in interceptions since Hall of Fame CB Mel Blount posted an NFL-best and team-record 11 picks in 1975.

Polamalu, who also had a three-game streak with an interception to start the season, had 87 tackles on the year, including 61 solo, to rank fourth on the team.

Polamalu signed a four-year extension with the team in the 2007 offseason and was selected to his fifth straight Pro Bowl in 2008.

Clark Return Is Key: **S Ryan Clark** finished the 2008 season with 113 tackles, including a season-high 12 in Week 16 at Tennessee, and eight passes defended. His 113 tackles were a career high and ranked second on the team despite missing the Week 9 matchup against his former team, the Washington Redskins, with a shoulder injury, and the season finale versus Cleveland with a shoulder injury.

Clark had season-ending surgery in 2007 (after Week 7) at Denver, and the Steelers defense allowed an uncharacteristic number of big plays during his absence.

Carter Carries The Load: **S Tyrone Carter** had a career-high two interceptions in the 2008 regular-season finale against the Cleveland Browns.

Carter, who made his second start of the season in place of injured S Ryan Clark, had arguably the best game of his career, returning one interception 32 yards for his first career touchdown in the fourth quarter.

In 2008, Carter finished with 17 tackles and three interceptions, which were second on the team.

Face Me Ike: **CB Ike Taylor** had a team-best 14 pass breakups in 2008 and ranked seventh on the team with 75 tackles (56 solo).

Taylor posted his first interception of the season against the Dallas Cowboys in Week 14. The interception set up the Steelers' first score of the game.

Young At Heart: **CB Deshea Townsend** is in his 12th year in the NFL and continues to be a major factor in the Steelers defensive success.

Townsend had arguably the biggest play of his career in the Week 14 victory over the Dallas Cowboys in 2008. With the score tied at 13-13 with less than two minutes remaining, Townsend picked off a Tony Romo pass and returned it 25 yards for the go-ahead touchdown. It marked his third career interception return for a score. For his efforts, he was named GMC Sierra Defensive Player of the Week (Week 14).

Townsend missed four games earlier in the season and started just four contests. His two interceptions were third (tied) on the team.

Gay Gearing Up: **CB William Gay** made four straight starts in 2008 and ranked second (tied) on the team with 11 pass breakups.

Gay notched his first career interception in the Week 15 victory over the Baltimore Ravens. He picked off a Joe Flacco pass in the end zone with less than 20 seconds remaining to seal the Steelers' victory.

Gay had 38 tackles on the year and posted nine special teams tackles in his first season of significant playing time.

Age Is Just A Number: Pittsburgh's defensive line was as productive as ever despite an average age of over 30 years old.

DE Aaron Smith (32), **DE Brett Keisel** (30) and **DT Casey Hampton** (31), along with backups **DE Travis Kirschke** (34), **DE Nick Eason** (28) and **DT Chris Hoke** (32), helped the Steelers rank second in the NFL in rushing defense and open gaps for

their linebackers to make plays. The Steelers allowed just 80.3 rushing yards per game.

The defensive line combined for 11 of the Steelers' 51 sacks (Smith - 5, Kirschke - 2, Eason - 1.5, Hampton - 1, Keisel - 1, Hoke - 0.5).

INDIVIDUAL SPECIAL TEAMS NOTES

Chart Topper: **K Jeff Reed** owns the team's second-best all-time mark for career field goal percentage.

Reed is 162-of-196 (.8265) for his career in the regular season, which is second in team history. Former K Norm Johnson finished his career with the Steelers making 105-of-127 field goal attempts, a .8267 career field goal percentage.

Mr. Clutch: **K Jeff Reed** booted two game-winning field goals in 2008.

In the Week 11 victory over the San Diego Chargers, Reed booted a 32-yard field goal with 11 seconds remaining to give Pittsburgh the win. It was his seventh career regular-season game-winning field goal.

Earlier in the year, Reed had a game-winning 46-yard field goal in Week 4 to defeat the Baltimore Ravens in overtime.

Getting His Kicks: **K Jeff Reed** was 36-for-37 on PATs and 27-for-31 in FGs for a team-best 117 points. His 117 points in 2008 tied for the second-most in his career, matching his 2005 total of 117 points.

Reed's performance in 2008 was that much more impressive considering his adjustment to both a new holder and new long-snapper midway through the season. He set a career long when he booted a 53-yard field goal in Week 3 at Philadelphia. It marked the fourth-longest (tied) field goal in team history and the longest since Kris Brown hit a team-record-tying 55-yard field goal on Oct. 14, 2001 at Kansas City.

Reed began the 2008 season perfect as he was 5-for-5 in PATs and 1-for-1 in FGs in the win over the Texans in Week 1.

Reed was 23-for-25 (.920) in field goals in 2007, with his only misses being a 65-yard attempt at Denver in Week 7 and a 44-yard field goal on a rain-soaked Heinz Field versus Miami in Week 12. He was a perfect 44-for-44 in PATs for a team-high 113 points.

Moving On Up: **K Jeff Reed** moved into second place on the team's all-time scoring list during the 2008 regular-season finale against the Cleveland Browns.

Reed finished with seven points, giving him 733 for his career, which is second only to Gary Anderson (1,343). He has 162 field goals (second in team history) and 247 PATs during his seven-year career with the Steelers. He is just the fourth kicker in team history to boot at least 100 field goals in a career, joining Gary Anderson (309), Roy Gerela (146) and Norm Johnson (105), and just the third player in team history to reach 700 points (Anderson, Gerela).

Reed Right On the Road: **K Jeff Reed** had made 18 straight field goals on the road prior to missing a 40-yard attempt in Week 13 at New England. He has made 21 of his last 23 (.913) away from Heinz Field and 38 of his last 41 (.927) field goal attempts on the road.

Mr. Dependable: **K Jeff Reed** continues to be one of the most productive field goal kickers in the NFL. Reed's 122 field goals since the beginning of the 2004 season place him third among kickers who have kicked in at least one Pro Bowl since the beginning of the 2004 season.

PITTSBURGH — The Steelers were powered by two fourth-quarter touchdowns from rookie **RB Isaac Redman** as they opened their 2009 preseason slate with a 20-10 victory over the Arizona Cardinals in a rematch of Super Bowl XLIII.

Neither team was able to muster much offense in the first half as both teams' first units played only two series each. Pittsburgh struck first midway through the second quarter. **K Jeff Reed** nailed a 50-yard field goal, set up in large part by a 45-yard pass completion down the right sideline from **QB Charlie Batch** to **WR Limas Sweed**.

Arizona tied the score at three on the final play of the half with a 29-yard field goal by K Neil Rackers. The Cardinals were given a free play because Steelers' **CB Anthony Madison** was called for pass interference on the previous play while making a sensational diving interception of a QB Matt Leinart pass.

The Steelers' 2009 rookie class took over in the second half. **CB Joe Burnett** intercepted Cardinals' QB Brian St. Pierre and returned the ball 42 yards to the three-yard line on the final play of the third quarter. Redman plunged into the end zone over right tackle on the first play of the fourth quarter for a 10-3 Steelers' advantage.

Pittsburgh struck again on their next offensive possession as **QB Dennis Dixon** led the team on a 12 play, 80-yard drive culminated with Redman's second rushing touchdown of the evening, this time from five yards out, to make it 17-3 in favor of the Steelers.

Arizona cut their deficit to 17-10 when QB Tyler Palko hit WR Onrea Jones for a 20-yard touchdown reception with 3:30 remaining in regulation. Pittsburgh closed the scoring following a 44-yard field goal by **K Piotr Czech**.

Dixon led the Steelers by completing 10-of-19 passes (52.6 pct.) for 112 yards and a passer rating of 70.5. Newcomer **WR Shaun McDonald** paced the receivers with six receptions for 69 yards (11.5 avg.) and Sweed posted two receptions for 56 yards (28.0 avg.). Redman finished with 10 rushing attempts for 32 yards (3.2 avg.) with two touchdowns.

The Steelers posted four sacks as **CB Keiwan Ratliff**, **LB LaMarr Hoodley** and **DE Ziggy Hood** each collecting one sack, while **LB Arnold Harrison** and **DE Sonny Harris** combined for the other. Ratliff tied for the team lead in tackles with six (all solo), along with **LB James Harrison** (three solo).

LANDOVER, Md. — The Washington Redskins took advantage of a fourth-quarter fumble by the Steelers' **Joe Burnett** and turned the miscue into a game-winning 18-yard touchdown pass to give the Redskins a 17-13 victory. The loss dropped Pittsburgh's preseason record to 1-1.

The Steelers appeared to have the Redskins stopped after a three-and-out on the opening possession, but Washington RB Rock Cartwright converted a fake punt, running 15 yards to midfield to keep the Redskins in business. Washington drove to the Steelers two-yard line, but Steelers' **LB Keyaron Fox** stopped RB Ladell Betts for a one-yard loss, and the Redskins had to settle for a 20-yard field goal from K Shaun Suisham.

Backup **QB Charlie Batch**, who started for an injured **QB Ben Roethlisberger**, led the Steelers on a nine-play, 50-yard drive that resulted in the Steelers taking their first lead, 7-3, late in the first quarter. Batch twice completed deep passes on third down, the first a 16-yard strike to **WR Santonio Holmes**, followed by a 24-yard hookup with **WR Hines Ward**. **RB Willie Parker** punctuated the drive with a three-yard touchdown run on a toss to the right side.

Pittsburgh upped their lead to 10-3 when **K Jeff Reed** booted a 34-yard field goal. Reed had two opportunities seconds later to further increase that lead, but missed on 53 and 48-yard attempts as time expired. Reed was set up for those attempts after **CB Keiwan Ratliff** intercepted QB Todd Collins and returned the ball to the Washington 35-yard line.

Washington tied the score in the third quarter when Daniel teamed up with **WR Marko Mitchell** for a three-yard touchdown to make the score 10-10. Pittsburgh went back in front, 13-10, when **K Piotr Czech** nailed a 41-yard field goal.

The Steelers, behind back-to-back sacks by rookie **DE Ziggy Hood**, stopped Washington at midfield early in the fourth quarter, but Burnett fumbled the ensuing punt return, setting the Redskins up at the Steelers' 18-yard line following the recovery.

PITTSBURGH — The Steelers' first units appear poised to pick up right where they left off in 2008 as they led the charge to a 17-0 blanking of the Buffalo Bills at Heinz Field. Pittsburgh improved their preseason record to 2-1 with the victory.

Pittsburgh dominated time of possession and total yards right from the opening drive. **QB Ben Roethlisberger** led the Steelers 50 yards to the Bills' 21-yard line, however a fumble by **RB Rashard Mendenhall** was recovered by Bills' LB Keith Ellison, stalling the drive.

The Steelers did strike first to take a 3-0 lead early in the second quarter when **K Piotr Czech**, filling in for the injured **K Jeff Reed**, converted a 34-yard field goal to cap a 13-play, 49-yard drive which saw Roethlisberger complete five-of-six passes for 41 yards.

Two plays later, on Buffalo's first play from scrimmage following the kickoff, Steelers' **LB James Farrior** stepped in front of the intended Bills' receiver for the interception and returned the ball 22 yards for the score and a quick 10-0 Steelers' advantage.

Mendenhall atoned for his earlier fumble 31 seconds before the first half was set to expire when he ran in untouched from four yards out to make the score 17-0 in favor of Pittsburgh. Roethlisberger again led the way through the air, this time completing five-of-seven passes for 74 yards.

After 30 minutes the Steelers had amassed 209 total yards compared to only 50 for the Bills, and they held a 21:46 to 8:14 time of possession advantage.

Neither team was able to put points on the board in the second half, although both teams had opportunities.

Czech missed a 40-yard attempt on the Steelers' opening possession of the half, while Buffalo's only chance to put points on the board was snuffed when Steelers' rookie **CB Joe Burnett** blocked Bills' K Rian Lindell's 33-yard field goal attempt with 2:58 remaining in the fourth quarter.

In only one half, Roethlisberger finished 15-of-19 (78.9 pct.) for 168 yards with a passer rating of 103.5. **WR Hines Ward** caught five passes for 74 yards (14.8 avg.), while Mendenhall led the ground attack with 48 yards on 16 attempts (3.0 avg.) with one touchdown.

Farrior had a huge night for the Steelers, tying for the team lead with four tackles (three solo), registering one sack, forcing a fumble, defending two passes and returning his interception 22 yards for a touchdown. **LB Donovan Woods** and **LB Arnold Harrison** combined for the Steelers' other sack.
